You may have heard about NASA releasing a rocket a couple of days ago but this was cancelled due to the weather. As it had been raining there was the chance that the launch could trigger lightning due to the excessive amount of electricity in the atmosphere. These were some rules they accumulated over the years from experience. SpaceX has never taken people to space before but they are hoping that this can reduce the cost of transportation with the long-term goal of creating a colony on Mars.

Robert L.Behnken and Douglas G. Hurley are the 2 astronauts that were selected by NASA in 2000 to travel in SpaceX. Both these men would have been staying at the space station for 2 weeks. Prior to this the NASA astronauts had gone into quarantine 2 weeks before they were expected to fly out and had been tested for COVID 19 on more than one occasion.

NASA has urged spectators to stay away from the Kennedy Space centre to limit the spread but they expected there to be a huge crowd. The takeoff took place on Saturday 30th May at 3:22pm.
